## ALYSSA'S LAW INTRODUCED IN THE SENATE

Sen. Anavitarte introduced new legislation to increase school safety and decrease the opportunity for domestic terrorists to falsely report school shooting incidents. Sen. Anavitarte's legislation, known as Alyssa's Law, after Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School shooting victim Alyssa Alhadeff, directs that public elementary & secondary school buildings be equipped with silent panic alarms that notify law enforcement.



#### SENATE BILL 93 INTRODUCED

SB 93 codifies the policy underlying Governor Brian Kemp's order to prohibit TikTok, Telegram, WeChat, and other national security software threats on state owned computers and devices. It will also prohibit these applications on state devices in the legislative and judicial branches, as well as K-12 schools in the State of Georgia. Additionally, the legislation calls on the director of the Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency to update the list of foreign adversaries whenever the federal government identifies additional foreign actors attempting to do harm to our national security. Georgians who are willing to accept the risk of CCP and other foreign-controlled malware are free to continue to use TikTok and other applications. This legislation will only apply to state employees and elementary and secondary students using stateowned devices in Georgia public schools.

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
